Holsworthy Walk and Talk by Gill Aston

We have been enjoying some autumnal sunshine on our walks and hope it will continue for our November programme.

Our Monday Walk in the Park Group was recently visited by members of the project Healthier Devon – Diabetes Prevention. There are currently record numbers of people with Type 2 diabetes, around 5 million in the UK, a number which has doubled since 1996. The Healthier Devon – Diabetes Prevention team work closely with people who have been diagnosed with pre-diabetes, encouraging and supporting changes to their diet and incorporating exercise into their daily lives. By addressing symptoms early, these changes can significantly reduce the need for medication and the likelihood of developing Type 2 diabetes.

Evelyn's Walks

On Monday 10th October, nine of us met by Halwill Parish Church. That's in Halwill Town NOT Junction. Pennie Channing is the relatively new P3 volunteer for Halwill & very kindly agreed to lead the walk. After all, she's far more familiar with the local PROWs (Public Rights of Way) than me. She suggested a route describing it as "a lovely & interesting walk across varied terrain, but not too difficult." She was concerned whether we could manage a distance of 4.4 miles. I was prepared to lead a shorter route for anyone who was not keen to try the longer one. However, everyone was very game to try Pennie's route so we all set off following the footpath that starts by the left hand side of the Church. It goes across the very lush green fields towards Langaford Farm & at one point, we could see where the railway line would have been. The cows all looked very content from their barn at the farm though it seemed far too nice a day to be indoors. It was a glorious autumnal morning with just a slight nip in the air. Instead of bearing left down the drive which would have joined the lane near Quoditch Cross, we followed the footpath. This was completely new territory for all of us apart from Pennie.



The route took us along a narrow path & across more lush green fields. At one point, we had to negotiate a stile but everyone managed admirably. Pennie pointed out a multitude of deer tracks & a couple of tumuli which we would probably have missed if she hadn't have been with us. If you look at an OS map, the tumuli are in fact marked. We then entered Cookworthy Moor Plantation & followed a nice hard track all the way to the A3079. This is the road that runs between Dunsland Cross & Halwill Junction. Knowing what a busy road this is, I was somewhat concerned. However, it was only a short distance before we went through a gate on the right hand side & then walked along a bridle path which goes across the property known as Cookworthy Buddle. By this stage, I had completely lost my sense of direction but the path was very clearly marked. By bearing right, we walked along the route of the old railway line & passed Brendon. At one point, we all looked over the parapet of the stone bridge & into the railway cutting from a bygone era. From here it was only a very short distance back to the road in Halwill. It came out right by the telephone box. We were all most grateful to Pennie for showing us this lovely route. It was just as she described & made a great start to the week.

The next walk will be on Monday 14th November. We will set off from Higher Larkworthy Farm in the parish of Ashwater, EX21 5DE at 10am. Please note that parking is limited. If you would like any more information, you are very welcome to contact me.

Torridge District Council launches third round of Household Support Funding



Torridge District Council has launched the third round of Household Support Funding with effect from Monday 17th October. Nationally £421m has been made available by central government to cover the period October 2022 to March 2023. Devon County Council has received £5m from this sum and allocated £193k for Household Support in the Torridge district.

In line with previous schemes the purpose of the grant is to provide support to households experiencing hardship due to the significant rises in living costs over recent months. The grants will be available to help people buy food, pay essential utility bills or meet other essential living or housing costs.

People will also be able to apply for assistance with other winter necessities such as warm clothing, blankets, and boiler servicing or repairs. Also falling under the criteria for the scheme will be cases where households are perhaps struggling to meet the cost of purchasing or repairing white goods such as fridges, freezers and ovens. To ensure a fairer overall distribution, priority will be given to applicants who have not received previous hardship funding in the current financial year from either Torridge's own Hardship fund or the second tranche of nationally funded Household Support. Due to the limited funds available the housing costs provision under the scheme, for example to cover rent arrears, will be limited to exceptional cases of genuine emergency.

Access to the fund will once again be via an application form, with initial applications being processed by the council's partner and local charity organisation, Encompass via this link Torridge Household Fund

Alternatively people can contact Encompass by telephone if they do not have access to the internet on 01271 371499.

Councillor Ken James – Leader of Torridge District Council said:

"The list of what funds can be used for is not exhaustive, so we want people to approach us if they feel they need help, not just for the payment types mentioned, but also if they have other costs they are struggling with. As further examples this might include essential clothing, repairs to their vehicles or to pay for a monthly bus pass, to name just a few. People can also check the councils "Cost of Living Help" section on the main landing page of our website for other funding and guidance links, which they might also find helpful."
