HOLSWORTHY WALK AND TALK BY GILLIAN ASTON



One of our Level 3 walks from a varied programme last month was at Highampton. Parking at Windmilland Cross we walked across the old railway line, through woodland and up through some quite soggy fields and back along the roads and railway line. The Level 3 route usually takes us in a loop around Odham but our Walk Leaders for the day considered it too wet to be safe. We did, however, walk down the road to Odham which gave us the lovely backdrop for our photo. On our way back we passed Burdon Grange, which is currently a home for residents ranging from young adults to elderly care, including those with physical and sensory impairment. The views across to Dartmoor from there are quite spectacular. The original house and lands are reported to have been in the Burdon family since Anglo Saxon times and the dining room still boasts Jacobean panelling around its walls. The rain managed to hold off until we had returned to our cars and the sun was even glinting through the autumnal leaves which were still bravely holding onto the trees despite the recent storms.

The festive season will not interrupt our Friday walk programme but the Walk in the Park will have two days being 25th December 2023 and 1st January 2014 when we will not be walking.

If you would like to join us we walk on Mondays and Fridays. All walks start at 10.30 am and are **FREE**.

On Monday 13th November, we met at Higher Larkworthy Farm with kind permission of the Kirk family. It's very much a working farm so we were very grateful for their kind hospitality. We reminisced about when we first went there for a walk in November 2019. There was some reluctance about actually leaving the farm for the walk as there was a litter of adorable puppies to coo over. We also remembered the fact that our walk had coincided with Remembrance Day & we had held a minute's silence at the top of Kit Hill. Nothing wrong with anyone's memory four years down the line.

By popular request, we followed the same route which took us through Larkworthy Farm & across the fields. We were all delighted to meet the sheep in an adjacent field. I believe they are known as Valais Blacknose. The breed was first brought into the UK from Switzerland in 2014 & has the reputation for being "the cutest sheep in the world". I'm reliably informed that we have had 158mm of rain between 1st & 13th November. Thankfully, the ground had absorbed it quite well & it wasn't too wet underfoot. The route was well marked & took us over a wooden foot bridge in order to cross the stream. We queried what it is called & in the absence of a phone signal to look it up, we christened it "Larkworthy Water". The footpath joined the lane at Henford. By turning left towards Ashwater, we went down the hill & across what I believe is called Henford Water which feeds into the River Carey. We then took deep breaths before plodding up Kit Hill. The views at the top were beautiful especially with the autumnal leaves. We then joined the private track which took us back to Higher Larkworthy Farm. We all noted that the trees in the orchard have grown well & the Glamping Pods blend in well with the natural environment.

This is going to be the last of my walks for this year. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the land owners who have kindly given us permission to park on their property; all the people who have led the walks; all those who have provided the most excellent company; & those at & in conjunction with DCC who work hard behind the scenes to keep our PROWs accessible for us to enjoy.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Airband FTTP project

Airband FTTP project: After award of the contract to install fibre to our area to Airband we were given a presentation in November 2020 outlining the project.

Timescales were given as:

NF040 –Clawton

- Surveying due to begin Summer 2021
- Build planned for Autumn/Winter 2021
- Completion due Spring 2022
- Build dates estimated, timings may change

Since then we have seen some activity both by vans with the Airband logo and others which turned out to be sub-contractors. But no news, either from the company or from Connecting Devon and Somerset which is running the project on behalf of the Government.

Our elected Devon County Councillor has not been seen or (largely) heard from since the election in May 2021 so I emailed the office of our MP, Sir Geoffrey Cox, even though strictly speaking local authority matters aren't in his area of responsibility. I did however receive a prompt response giving the text of the reply his office had received. It reads (exactly) as follows:

"The village of Clawton sits within our Cluster NF040. This is a particularly large cluster (94 kms of cabling) and has been extremely challenging. There has been delays in getting the main connection to the cabinet to bring "light" or the data signal to the cluster. There has also lots of ongoing works to connect from the cabinet outwards to ensure that the splice connections, and parallel works to stand some of the infrastructure in preparation. The Light is needed to ensure that all the splice connections from the Cabinet along the main spine route, to all the Laterally branches off this and further branches to the distribution points, are resilient and reliable to provide a stable connection.

The forecast from the Project Team responsible for this cluster is that they are working to complete by Q1 2024 (spring).

We do understand communities frustrations, but the teams are working as expediently as practicable to ensure this is a robust network for these communities."

Hmmmmmm.....We'll see.....



Shopping online can save time and effort and gives you a wide choice of goods from around the world.

Unfortunately, while most buyers and sellers are genuine, fraudsters use online shopping scams because they can hide their identity and target many victims at the same time.

What you can do to protect yourself

Buying online

Do some research to find out what a fair or competitive price is for similar goods in the same condition; if the offer sounds too good to miss out on, it might not really exist, be fake or of inferior quality.

Fraudsters often use stock images or other people's images, or use the same image on multiple websites/adverts. You can check if images appear elsewhere on the internet through websites like [TinEye](#) or [reverse.photos](#).

Check the seller or buyer's review history and feedback from other reviewers. Beware of accounts that may have been set up very recently with lots of favourable feedback that sounds similar, this could be an indication of fake reviews.

Always use the site's recommended payment site, if they have one, and read the terms and conditions to understand what you are protected for. If you pay any other way than via a recommended payment site, you may not be able to recover your money.

Where there's no recommended payment site, paying via credit card or known third party payment providers is preferable to direct bank transfers. Check your bank statements or online account regularly.

Make sure that the website you're buying from is genuine – and not a fake or copycat site – by typing in the address yourself and checking the spelling. Fake addresses usually vary from authentic ones with just one or two incorrect letters.

Research sellers' and other bidders' selling history. And bear in mind that a website ending '.co.uk' doesn't necessarily mean it's based in the UK. Check the address of the company and the phone number.

Don't make payment over insecure WiFi (a public WiFi or one with no password to access).

Make sure you're making payments on a secure site. You can check the link is secure in two ways:

1. there should be a padlock symbol in the browser window where you can see the site address / URL when you log in or register (beware on unfamiliar sites as this can be faked); if you're not sure the webpage is genuine, don't use it.; be sure that the padlock is within the address bar at the top of the screen, not on the page itself
2. the web address should begin with 'https://'; the 's' stands for 'secure'


