# HOLSWORTHY WALK AND TALK BY GILLIAN ASTON

We often refer to the benefits of walking to both physical and psychological health and were interested to read of a new study from the European Society of Cardiovascular health. The study showed that the risk of dying from disease of the heart and blood vessels are reduced even by taking a short daily walk of one mile. The researchers went on to say that 'In a world where we have more and more advanced drugs to target specific conditions such as cardiovascular disease, we should always emphasise that life-style changes like walking are at least as, or even more effective in reducing cardiovascular risk and prolonging lives'.

It is always satisfying to be able to prove theory in every day life and to that effect we are proud to have two regular nonagenarian walkers in our Monday Walk in the Park group. Pam celebrated her 90<sup>th</sup> birthday last month and Marion, our Walk Leader, notched up 91 years. The kitchen ladies at The Coffee Room very generously made a cake for Pam which we all enjoyed. We had a very sociable morning with lots of laughter and congratulations and put into practice other research that socialising and being part of a group have far reaching benefits to overall health. The Coffee Room ladies were particularly pleased to be able to provide for and share Pam's special birthday as their ethos is to provide a welcoming space to promote and support emotional well being. ## PARISH COUNCIL NEWS BY PAUL GRAFTON

**Speeding:** Councillor Graham Hames is still working on our project to provide speed warning signs on the main road at either end of the village, and is currently engaging in ongoing discussions with Highways at Devon County Council.

Next Parish Council Meeting: This will be held on Wednesday 18th September 2024.

**Superfast Internet:** A recent email from Connecting Devon and Somerset said;

"Airband is under contract with Connecting Devon and Somerset (CDS) to provide gigabit-capable broadband to this area. It is therefore deeply disappointing that the company has put the work on hold and completion has been so delayed.

CDS is not alone in experiencing this and Airband is not the only company with delays to its network build. There are well-evidenced challenges affecting local and central Government contracts showing that costs

of delivery in predominantly rural areas have escalated with the result that many alt-net providers and their investors are refocusing efforts on increasing take-up on their existing networks rather than network expansion.

In the case of Airband, the company is responding to these conditions with a restructuring of the business and seeking to maximise its sales income. CDS is in communication with Airband about the factual position regarding the company and investor's plans in relation to the CDS Programme and contractual obligations. We are also seeking clarity from Building Digital UK regarding the scale, scope and final number of Project Gigabit contracts covering Devon and Somerset. Please keep an eye on the CDS website for all updates on the CDS programme. "

## **EVELYN'S WALK**

Whilst writing this, it's pouring with rain. I'm so pleased that it didn't rain for our walk on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> July.

We met at Crinacott Farm in Pyworthy with kind permission of Mike Godfrey and his family. Knowing how busy a person he is, we were very fortunate that Mike was available to lead the way



initially. He showed us his vegetables growing in his poly-tunnel. It was reassuring to learn that he has also found it a challenging year with every conceivable pest trying their best to thwart his best efforts. In spite of them, his runner beans were looking very impressive. He then introduced us to his two female Emus. They obviously consider Mike to be a very dear friend and nestled up to him and chattered away in a very guttural tone. Mike was very informative telling us the differences between Emus, Ostriches and Rheas. From what he told us, out of the three types of Ratite, I would opt for Emus BUT whatever would I do with all those eggs that they produce between January and March? They are a very beautiful blue/green colour BUT enormous! Mike then encouraged us to walk through his woodland that he planted a few years ago. It's not the route of the footpath so we were very appreciative as it gave us the opportunity to see how the trees had grown since our last visit. He had mown a path so we couldn't lose our way and it brought us out by the footbridge at Derril Water.

The route wasn't immediately obvious but by keeping the pylon on our left and walking straight across a little grassy field, we saw the wooden pedestrian gate hiding in the hedge opposite. By following the path between the paddocks, we emerged onto the lane by Northmoor and Southmoor Farms. We

turned left and walked along the lane towards North Tamerton. We then turned left again and walked up quite a steep hill towards Yeamadon. It was noticeable how the way-markers have become hidden by the vegetation at this time of year but having walked this route previously, we knew which galvanised gate we needed to go through in order to follow the footpath across the lush green fields back towards Crinacott Farm. It made a lovely circular walk for everybody and made a great start to the week.

Academics in need of 1,000 slugs for research purposes have appealed to the public to catch the gastropods and send them via post.

The project, run by Harper Adams University in Shropshire, aims to reduce reliance on pellet usage by studying slug behaviour.

Researchers now need more of them, in order to test out slug-resistant wheat.

"The slugs get a really good life. It's fine to send them through the post, as long as you don't do so on a Thursday or Friday," said Prof Keith Walters from the university.

"Once they arrive at the lab, then they're treated to the most delicious organic lettuce while they're waiting to take part in the scientific tests," he told BBC Radio Shropshire.
