HOLSWORTHY WALK AND TALK BY GILLIAN ASTON

The first topic of conversation on arriving at most of our walks last month was 'What shall I wear?' It always helps to take a selection of clothes and foot wear, especially on our Friday walks, but then it is easy to discover when, half way along the route, the truth of the saying that there is no such thing as bad weather just poor clothing choices!

Despite the weather we had some lovely walks. We reintroduced a route we haven't used for some time starting from Bradworthy Square and heading out to Cleverdon on the Sutcombe Road. Passing Cleverdon Farm several of our walkers recalled visiting a doctor who once lived and practised there. While we were gathered by the property a young man came to speak to us who was the grandson of the doctor and who now lives at the property.

We also visited Buckland Filleigh which is always a joy. On our recce of the route a few days prior to the Friday walk hay making was in progress in the parkland. The sun was shining and the beautiful meadow hay was being rowed up ahead of being baled. There will be some very lucky ponies this winter having such hay put in front of them! Tree felling was also taking place in the wood next to the parkland. We enjoyed watching the great care being taken by the forester to ensure that operations were carried out safely.

Thanks must go to Devon County Council for repairing the footbridge which crosses a river in a section of woodland along the route. The whole length of the bridge has been replaced and looks set to last for many years. Coming out of this particular woodland we walked through a field of oats which we don't see very often so that gave us something to talk about – flapjacks sprang to mind as it is quite an arduous walk and it was getting near to lunch time.

If you would like to join us, we walk on Mondays and Fridays starting at 10.30 am and all walks are **FREE**. Membership forms are available from our Volunteer Walk Leaders prior to the start of the walk.

EVELYN'S WALK

On Monday 12th August, we met at Tetcott Village Hall. Anyone who has been there will know that there is a cattle grid at the entrance. The timing was such that the noise of our vehicles going over the cattle grid just as the Farmer was trying to encourage his cattle to come out of the gateway of the field opposite was enough to put them right off the idea. Bad timing! We literally tip-toed out of the car park, turned left and



trotted down the hill leaving the Farmer to deal with his cattle in peace. When we reached the sign, we turned right towards Luffincott. This lane is the approach to Luffincott Barton and St. James' Church. It's a very long drive and it wasn't surprising that the Recycling lorry went all the way to the house to collect the recycling rather than from the end of the drive. We ventured into the Church which is a Grade I listed building and is maintained by the Churches Conservation Trust. We admired it for its simplicity; its beautiful barrel vaulted roof; its 14th century font and some beautiful stained glass windows. We then followed the footpath across Tetcott Estate. The last time we had walked this route was in November '21. It was interesting to note the differences at a different time of year and a couple of years later. The pasture was lusher and the mature trees had a much denser canopy hiding the River Tamar completely to our left. We followed the course of a little stream and it was surprisingly muddy in places. We didn't complain (much) as the mud enabled us to see evidence of the wildlife that uses the same route including deer and otter. We could easily have missed the derelict cottage that is gradually being taken over by nature. It used to be inhabited by a music teacher. We mused about her carrying her shopping home as it would have been quite a trek from the nearest road. The footpath brought us to Tetcott Manor and the Church which we all admired. We then walked across the parkland known as The Wilderness which was being grazed by sheep. We negotiated our way quietly through the pedestri-

an gates adjacent to the cattle grids so at least we didn't disturb their morning. We admired the beautiful gate piers at the narrow entrance to the Estate. We turned right and arrived back at the Village Hall without seeing any sign of those spooked cattle. We were hopeful that the Farmer had managed to move them as he had intended whilst we were on our walk. Everyone enjoyed the circular route which was approx. four miles and took us approx. two and a half hours.

The next walk will be on Monday 9th September. We will set off from East Vognacott Farm near Chilsworthy with kind permission of the owner.
