

As I am compiling this report for the Clarion, I am trying to see through sea salt covered windows, even the side window has become cloudy! Just shows what a momentous storm we have just encountered. Do hope everyone did not have too much damage. We have lost greenhouse panes and polytunnel covering, the frame was ripped from its "moorings", and the frame is all bent!!

Questions are being asked about the "Queen's Platinum Jubilee" celebrations - plans are afoot for a village tea on the Sunday, along with the Parish Council & Church, we at the hall will be organising the afternoon, we would welcome any helpers in this task as we are all small in number. Our Saturday brewery afternoons (3.30 to 7ish) have been a great success, last week we enjoyed fish and chips delivered by our own "uber" driver. When the rugby was being shown we provided sausages in rolls at a small cost. A barrel of beer is purchased



each week along with cans of cider, wine and soft drinks, we charge the same as the brewery. When Dave opens the brewery again we will stop these afternoons. We aim to appeal to the residents of Clawton and friends.

We have short mat bowls on Monday afternoon, in the evening there is a Zumba group who meet for exercise!! Tuesday & Thursday are for skittles during their season. The first Wednesday evening each month hosts the WOW group. Women on Wednesday (a relaxed time to meet and have and chat with friends), with speakers and more practical demos too. Second Friday of the month the Railway club meet in the evening. Home from Home coffee mornings are also held in the hall on the second Friday mornings each month. We aim to have a plant sale, alongside local produce and coffee/bacon bap Saturday morning in April or May.

Our hall provides a meeting point for all.

Monthly Walks from Evelyn Sharman

By hook or by crook, everyone managed to find their way to Dunsdon Nature Reserve on Monday 14th February. It isn't the easiest place to find & there are various ways of getting there. I have been known to do a few extra miles in my attempts to locate it previously!!

If you don't already know, it's situated in the Parish of Pancrasweek & has quite a big car park. Rather than venture through the actual Nature Reserve which has a reputation for being wet, we walked back to the entrance of the car park & turned right along the lane. This took us past the beautifully renovated Chapel at Lana & we could admire the Church of St. Pancras in the distance. If you ever get lost along the lanes, the Church makes a good landmark back towards the A3072 at Weekstone Cross.

By constantly bearing right, we achieved a very pleasant circular walk. We could have stayed on the lanes but we ventured along the footpath on our right which effectively follows the route of the Bude Aqueduct bringing us out at Puckland. At one point, we could have turned right & returned to our cars by going through the Nature Reserve. For the same reason as I mentioned earlier, we didn't take that option but I would like to go back there in drier weather. The lane took us past Broomhill on our right & by turning right at Dunsdon Cross, we completed our right hand loop & returned to the entrance to the car park.



For those of you with an OS map, you could trace our route quite easily. Of course, there are more modern ways of doing the same. It took us less than two hours with various stops to discuss the way markers. I hadn't considered that there were so many ways of pronouncing some of the local names including Pancrasweek, Lana & the best was Lishaperhill. I felt pretty safe with Puckland & Broomhill! Just to confuse the matter, one of the way markers referred to Kilkhampton & Statton (?!). To brighten up our walk, we spotted an early Primrose & we identified stalactites on one of the bridges over the Bude Aqueduct. It really wasn't too muddy underfoot so I'm guessing that not many people know about this lovely walk. Oops, the secret is out now.

The next walk will be on Monday 14th March. We will set off at 10am from the Village Hall car park in Bridgerule. Anyone is welcome to join me. If you would like more information, you can contact me.

CLAWTON VILLAGE SURVEY

Looking back at the Parish Survey in 2012 much has been achieved.

Over the past 10 years with support from Torridge DC we have succeeded in locating the owners of the two buildings next to the former shop (East Cottage and the old Chapel schoolroom) and promoting their sale. East Cottage has been fully restored to a family home and the old Chapel schoolroom has been purchased and given a new roof and hopefully will be renovated in due course. We also made contact with the owner of the old Chapel who have carried out repairs and stay there from time to time.

We have supported a modest number of new-build houses while trying to ensure the interests of local residents are taken into account. When the development next to the village car park begins we will be given some land to extend the car park and we have reserved funds to surface it.

The Housing Association which owns the garages at Claw Park now have planning permission to demolish them and the plan is to provide extra parking for the school to try to mitigate the congestion which still occurs at the end of the school day.

We have supported the church in the maintenance of the churchyard, which is a public facility open to all denominations and none. We have supported the village hall committee who have done a great job of refurbishing and updating the hall and the facilities, including the kitchen and the car park.

We have taken on the future cost of the defibrillator at the hall entrance which was originally funded by money raised by Anita Fisher and the Parish Hall Committee.

For a couple of years now many households have been able to access fast broadband via the Airband system. Within the next few months Superfast Broadband will be available to many through the Airband Fibre to the Premises system supported by the Connecting Devon and Somerset programme.
