PARISH COUNCIL NEWS BY PAUL GRAFTON

Clawford Vineyard/Lakes

The site was sold to a new owner and now an application has been made to extend the property into another field including building more cabins, an indoor swimming pool and an outdoor pool and water slides. After conversations with some residents closely affected as well as others the Parish Council has submitted an objection based on a number of issues.

Fundamentally, the intention seems to be to change from a site providing accommodation with some aimed at fishing holidays but mainly as a base for holidaymakers visiting the area, to a full-blown leisure park along the lines of Centre Parcs where the strategy seems to be to try to provide facilities which will keep guests on site. There may well be a gradual process of incremental planning applications which over time could mean we're living next to a major tourist attraction which had it been proposed from the start would have been refused as out of scale and out of keeping with the surrounding area. It is also without appropriate infrastructure, being accessed solely by narrow single-track lanes.

Already, light pollution is significantly greater than promised by the original developer, and an open-air water slide facility aimed at children is likely to significantly increase the noise generated near local houses.

While the consultation period closed on 19th May (the application was submitted too late for the May Clarion and is closing too early for the June Clarion) it should still be possible to submit your comments on the Torridge Planning website, where you can find full details of the application and the Parish Council's objection. When searching use just the term 'Clawford' because various documents are under both 'Clawford Lakes' and 'Clawford Vineyard'.

Ruby Country Medical Group

The group recently invited representatives from councils in the area to a meeting to talk about the service they are offering. They explained how they were organised, some data about the numbers of patients they look after and the funding they receive to do so, and also talked about some of the improvements they are working on.

Some insights gained from the meeting include:

- Currently appointments are approximately 75% face-to-face, 25% by telephone.
- Car parking issues include customers of Boots who are queuing, and even some people who appear to be using it as a free car park when catching the bus.
- In March there were about 100 GP appointments where the patient didn't show that's around a weeks' worth of appointments for a doctor.
- Long NHS waiting lists (especially since Covid) have a significant knock-on effect on GPs because the illnesses need to be managed until the patient has reached the end of the queue for treatment.
- They now have a new phone system which is better able to manage calls, including a callback facility.

One major surprise (to me at least) was that both they and Boots are tenants in a building they rent – they do not control the building, and they have no influence over Boots' service. It was for example Boots, who decided they wanted to keep the roller shutter between them and the surgery waiting room in place.

It seems they cannot recommend other prescription fulfilment services, but I can. I know Boots themselves are offering an online repeat prescription service but I would thoroughly recommend the service I receive from Pharmacy2U. Their app reminds me each month. I click on those medications on the list I wish to receive that month and the rest is taken care of, with a package arriving in the post a few days later. If I get a new prescription, I can ask the surgery to send it to Pharmacy2U rather than to Boots, if I don't need it immediately. No more queuing in the rain 4Me!

Another meeting is planned in the near future, and we may be running a short survey so we can give them robust data on your view of their service.

New Defibrillator in Clawton

We now have a third defibrillator located next to the brewery – on the wooden building on the left if facing the brewery entrance. As with the others, in an emergency call 999 and give the location number and you will receive the code to access the machine.

The other two defibrillators are to the left of the village hall entrance, and at the school.



EVELYN'S WALK

After several consecutive days without rain, it couldn't stay dry any longer. We met in the Village Hall car park in Chilsworthy on Monday 13th May wearing waterproofs. It was only drizzle but quite wetting. In spite of that, we set off in fine spirits towards The Green which had obviously been cut recently.



Quite an achievement given how wet it's been this spring. We followed the BOAT (By-way Open to All Traffic) which reduced the distance that we needed to walk on the road heading towards the Chapel & Quarry Park. We followed the footpath on the left which took us along the edge of grassy fields. We all commented on the self-closing gate that has replaced the stile. It made the route so much easier especially as stiles can be a bit slippery when they get wet. The route was well marked & took us over the stream via a footbridge & through another self-closing gate. We then followed the footpath across more grassy fields towards the road. This can be quite a busy road running between Chilsworthy & Bradworthy but in reality we only saw a couple of cars before we turned left in approx. 100m along the lane towards Burnards House. The hedge must have been shorter than when we walked this route in August last year as the Tumulus was immediately obvious in the adjacent field. If you look on an OS map, it is marked as Ugworthy Barrow. We walked along the lane which was looking very pretty with Bluebells & frothy Cow Parsley. We passed the entrance to Thorne Manor on our right & then joined the footpath on the left. It's actually the drive for Parnacott House which has an interesting history. There is lots of information on their web site. The footpath continues through the courtyard & along a track towards Parnacott Farm. This is notoriously wet given its close proximity to the route of the Bude Canal in times
